Theme is:

- Main idea or an underlying meaning of a literary work, which may be stated directly or indirectly.
- Universal: broad themes that relate across cultures and countries. For example, love, suffering, courage.
- Often stated implicitly, rather than directly

Where to find the theme:

- ▶ Plot: What are the main plot elements in the work, including the setting and the characters. What are the most important moments in the story? How does it end? How is the central conflict resolved?
- Protagonist: Who is the main character, and what happens to him or her? How does he or she develop as a person over the course of the story?
- Prominent symbols or images: Are there any patterns or symbols that are featured prominently in the work—for example, in the title, or recurring important moments in the story—that might mirror some of the main themes?
